Club News

University Amateur Radio Club Takes on Winter Field Day: A Test of Skill and Endurance

Braving the cold and the challenges of off-grid communication, the University Amateur Radio Club recently participated in Winter Field Day, an annual event that puts radio operators to the test in harsh conditions. Designed to simulate emergency scenarios, Winter Field Day encourages amateur radio enthusiasts to hone their skills in setting up portable stations, operating in extreme weather, and maintaining reliable communication under less-than-ideal circumstances. For the club members of the university's radio club, this event was not just a technical challenge but also an opportunity to bond as a team, apply their knowledge in real-world settings, and engage with the broader ham radio community.

Winter Field Day was conducted in Washington Park under the designation "20," signifying two simultaneous outdoor transmitters under the call of N7UW. All radios were housed in a canvas wall tent, generously provided by Chris Rice N7NAV, which served as our base of operations throughout the event. The club set up two operating positions, allowing radios to be brought in as needed or utilizing one of the two club HF radios on-site. These radios were connected to band-pass filters, ensuring that one radio could transmit without interfering with the receiving station. Primary power was supplied by a 400-amp-hour battery bank, supplemented by a generator to maintain reliable operation. This setup maximized our efficiency and ensured smooth communication despite the winter conditions.

With Winter Field Day taking place in the heart of winter, the event was not without its challenges. The primary issue was maintaining a heated operating location. Our original heating plans ran into mechanical issues, forcing us to quickly find an alternative solution to keep operators safe in the below-freezing temperatures. Thanks to the assistance of Ben, KF7UFF, we were able to secure a suitable heating system that ensured everyone's safety and comfort.

Another major challenge the club faced was one that many HF operators dread—man-made noise. As soon as the sun set, intermittent interference disrupted operations, making late-night contacts particularly difficult. The noise fluctuated in intensity throughout the night, requiring operators to adjust their strategy. To work around this, we maximized our operating time during quieter periods and took breaks when the interference returned, making the most of the available windows for clear communication.

Even with the elements working against us and the challenges we had to overcome, our team's hard work paid off with an impressive final score. We logged a total of 535 contacts, including 138 made using CW, with the remaining contacts completed via voice. Notably, three of our voice contacts were made through amateur radio satellites, thanks to the skilled operations of Douglas N6UA, earning us five valuable multipliers. In total, we secured 20 multipliers, bringing our final score to a respectable 13,460 points. It was a fantastic effort from everyone involved, and the experience provided valuable lessons and growth opportunities as we look ahead to our next Winter Field Day.

We will be hosting a community foxhunt on Saturday morning, February 22nd at Washington Park. We are going to invite the boy scouts and cub scouts to participate and learn more about amateur radio. Let's have a good showing of club members to mentor these kids!
