Text-to-Speech Notetaking, Transcription, and Recording Reference Sheet

DSS meets with students to discuss notetaking as an accommodation and skill. Some professors require digital notetaking or specific software to be approved via DSS to use them in the classroom. If you plan to use electronic notetaking it's a good idea to talk with your coordinator.

Adobe Acrobat Reader/DC

- Free
- Read Out Loud Feature
 1. Select "View" in top left corner
 2. Select "Read Out Loud"
 3. Select "Activate Read Out Loud"
 4. Go back through steps 1 & 2 then select "Read Out Loud" and choose preferences

Office 365

- All UW (University of Wyoming) students have access to the online Office 365 resources for free

Word

- Immersive Reader (reads documents aloud)
 1. Login into UW web-based email
 2. Select the square icon in the top left corner
 3. Select Word
 4. In Word, open a document
 5. Select "View"
 6. Select "Immersive Reader"
- Dictate (speech-to-text option; great for notetaking)
 1. Login into UW web-based email
 2. Select the square icon in the top left corner
 3. Select Word
 4. In Word, open a document
 5. Select "Home"
 6. Select "Dictate" (microphone icon)

OneNote

- Immersive Reader (reads documents aloud)
 1. Login into UW web-based email
 2. Select the square icon in the top left corner
 3. Select OneNote
 4. In OneNote, open a document
 5. Select "View"

- 6. Select “Immersive Reader”
- Dictate (speech-to-text option; great for notetaking)
 - 1. Login into UW web-based email
 - 2. Select the square icon in the top left corner
 - 3. Select OneNote
 - 4. In OneNote, open a document
 - 5. Select “Home”
 - 6. Select “Dictate” (microphone icon)
