

Regional Referral Networks and Resources for Children with Epilepsy: Serving Children and Their Families in the Intermountain West

A LEADERSHIP PROJECT OF URLEND TRAINEES
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Mission Statement

Approximately 456,000 children live with epilepsy in the United States (Epilepsy Foundation, 2024), yet access to specialized epilepsy care depends heavily on geography, and families living in rural regions encounter underprepared systems of care, long travel distances, higher costs, and limited coordination amongst providers and community resources (Gotlieb et al., 2025). These barriers may not only delay diagnosis and intervention but also increase stress on families due to the strain of managing the medical, social, and practical implications of managing seizures. Inadequate referral networks further contribute to care inequities, particularly for children who require coordinated care across multiple providers, educational supports, and community resources.

To help families navigate systems of care for their children with epilepsy, a team from the Utah Regional Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental Disabilities (URLEND) developed a project with two aims. The first was to interview individuals with epilepsy and their caregivers to understand the lived experiences of navigating epilepsy care in the Intermountain West. The second was to apply their lived experiences to a resource guide for newly diagnosed children and their families to ease the burden of finding support on their own. Chapters of this guidebook will provide specific resources within the states of the URLEND region. Each chapter is organized by resource type, then by the state where the resource is located. At the beginning of the guide, there is advice and considerations from families who have navigated epilepsy care in hopes of helping newly diagnosed children and their families understand what to expect and prioritize. Additional information about specific providers is available at the end of the guide.

This URLEND team is the regional extension of the greater LEND network (<https://www.aucd.org/about-lends>), a Maternal and Child Health Bureau program to provide interdisciplinary health training to professionals. URLEND covers the five-state region of Utah, Idaho, Montana, North Dakota, and Wyoming. Trainees complete 300 hours of didactic, clinical, and leadership training to provide optimal services to children with special health care needs within a family-centered, culturally-responsive framework. The authors of this guide represented multiple disciplines and three different states in the URLEND region (Utah, North Dakota, and Wyoming). 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The authors would like to sincerely thank every individual who lent their time and shared vulnerable experiences living with epilepsy to help create this guidebook. The voices of these individuals are woven throughout this guidebook in the hopes that future epilepsy families will not have to face the same challenges that they did. Every individual who lent their time and experience has a role in empowering future families to find and access supportive care in the Intermountain West. We thank you for trusting us with your stories and experiences.

Considerations from Families

The comments and considerations below are based on conversations and survey responses from individuals with epilepsy and their caregivers. Families who were interviewed and completed surveys were consistently strong advocates, system navigators, and care coordinators for themselves or their children. Their combination of self-education, persistence, and planning significantly impacted both care and quality of life for their families. The hope is that their experiences can help provide support and encouragement for others.

Diagnosis and Education

- Seek out additional education at the time of diagnosis. Don't assume providers will cover everything.
- Learn from your child and their unique experience; epilepsy looks different for every person.
- Recognize that seizures can look very different from each other and from what is typically described as a seizure.
- A diagnosis is not a death sentence. Life will look different, but it is still meaningful and full.

Advocacy & Working with Providers

- Trust your instincts as a caregiver. Your perspective is critical.
- Speak up if something feels wrong. You don't need to accept dismissal or minimization.
- Document symptoms and experiences to share with providers.
- You may need to be persistent in seeking answers; treatment changes or responses may require ongoing effort.
- Advocate for flexibility in care (e.g., trying different treatments or providers when possible).
- Recognize that not all providers will be the right fit. Sometimes switching providers is an option, but recognize that limited choice and access can be barriers.

Navigating Healthcare Systems & Access

- Expect challenges with:
 - Insurance coverage and provider restrictions. Be sure to review your insurance for what kind of out-of-state coverage you have if you have to travel for specialty care.
 - Limited appointment availability and long waitlists.
 - Medication access and refills: You may have to follow up repeatedly with providers and pharmacies to ensure you have the correct medication when you need it.
- Use available supports such as:
 - Care coordinators (through insurance or clinics). There may be local organizations that can help navigate care as well, such as family resource centers.

- Copay assistance programs. Some pharmacies have programs that you can enroll in.
- Telehealth may be available in some instances, but it may have cross-state limitations that still require you to be in the state where the provider is licensed to practice. Clearly discuss expectations for telehealth appointments in advance.

Long-Term Planning & Adult Transition

- Start early when planning for adulthood, especially with:
 - Transitioning from pediatric to adult care systems
 - Medicaid to adult waiver programs
 - Living arrangements, financial supports, and legal considerations
- Apply early for disability services and waivers, as these systems are complex and slow.
- Be aware of added challenges (e.g., HIPAA/privacy) when caring for an adult child.

Treatment Approach & Flexibility

- Treatment often requires trial and error and time. What works for one person may not work for another.
- You may need to be open to exploring different options when appropriate (e.g., alternative treatments) and to seeking providers willing to consider them.
- Continue moving forward with treatment, even when progress feels slow.

Emotional Impact

- It is normal to experience grief, fear, or isolation after diagnosis.
- Give yourself grace. You are learning as you go.
- Avoid second-guessing yourself; trust that you are doing your best with the information you have.
- Growth often comes from experience. You will develop patience, understanding, and resilience along the way.

Caregiver Well-being

- Caregiving is demanding. Be sure to look for opportunities to care for yourself, and communicate this need to providers and support systems.
- Seek mental health support (therapy, counseling, employee wellness programs).
- Recognize your limits and recognize that you might not be able to do everything at once to avoid burnout.

Building Support Systems

- When possible, find and connect with other families or individuals living with epilepsy.
- Build a community of family members, friends, and those around you for emotional and practical support. You may have to do some education to help them understand the reality you are living.

- Lean on informal supports (friends, family) as well as formal ones (support groups, respite care).
- Take advantage of all available resources through your medical providers, employers, and community.

Epilepsy Providers

Overview

Provider information was gathered for Utah, Wyoming, and North Dakota. While prioritizing the identification and documentation of pediatric providers who offer neurology and epilepsy services, adult providers are also included, recognizing that in some rural areas, they may be the only available resource. While not all adult providers see pediatric patients, many in rural areas will accept them, even if they cannot provide comprehensive care and must refer them to pediatric providers in the region. This section was organized by identifying the health systems where providers worked, along with other service-specific information. Address, website, and phone number for the health system can be found in the “Children’s Medical Centers” section of the Resource Guide. Smaller clinic information, along with names and titles of providers of each health system, can be found in the appendix. If any information regarding a provider’s location is unavailable, families are encouraged to contact the health system for that information.

Utah

Primary Children’s Hospital - Eccles Primary Children’s Outpatient Services:

- **Care Provided:** Pediatric Neurology, Neurophysiology, Pediatric Epilepsy, Neuromuscular Diseases, Neurology, Muscular Dystrophy, Neurogenetics, Headache (migraine), and Ketogenic Diet.
 - Dr. Shanna M. Swartwood (MD) does neurosurgery, RNS/VNS, and TSC. Most of Dr. Swartwood’s patients are surgical candidates and TSC.
- **Ages of Children Accepted:** 0-18 years old for first-time patients. Up to 24 years old for returning patients.
- **Insurances Accepted:** All. Uninsured patients receive financial support via a sliding scale.
- **Referral Required:** Two referral pathways - 1) Fast-track clinic - EEG, complex or non-epileptic seizures; if non-epileptic seizures, then seen by a neurologist. Within 4-6 weeks from seizure, but aim for 2-3 weeks. 2) PCP Diagnosis.
- **Telehealth:** Offered for established patients.
- **Providers Traveling to Other Sites:** Providers have privileges in other hospitals. However, they typically only see patients in Salt Lake City and Lehi, Utah and do readings for Montana patients.
- **Accepting New Patients:** Yes, as of April 2026.
- **Providers Referring to Other Providers:** Providers at Primary Children’s Hospital see all patients that are referred to them and do not refer to anyone else.
- **Interpreters and Accessibility Accommodation:** Available for all patients.

Intermountain Health: St. George Neurology Clinic

- **Care Provided:** Epilepsy and neurology.
- **Ages of Children Accepted:** 19+.
- **Providers Traveling to Other Sites:** No.
- **Accepting New Patients:** Yes, as of April 2026.

Intermountain Health: McKay Dee Neurology Clinic

- **Care Provided:** Epilepsy, neurology, and movement disorders.
- **Ages of Children Accepted:** 19+.
- **Providers Traveling to Other Sites:** Some providers do travel to other sites, such as Logan Regional Hospital (Utah) and Cassia Regional Hospital (Idaho).
- **Accepting New Patients:** Yes, as of April 2026.

Intermountain Health: Neuroscience Institute

- **Care Provided:** Epilepsy and neurology.
- **Ages of Children Accepted:** 19+.
- **Providers Traveling to Other Sites:** Yes, some providers travel to other locations.
- **Accepting New Patients:** Yes, as of April 2026.

Utah Valley Clinic

- **Care Provided:** Epilepsy and neurology.
- **Ages of Children Accepted:** 19+.
- **Providers Traveling to Other Sites:** Some providers travel to other sites.

Wyoming

Cheyenne Regional Medical Center

- **Care Provided:** Epilepsy and neurology.
- **Ages of Children Accepted:** Only 18+.
- **Telehealth:** Rarely.
- **Providers Traveling to Other Sites:** No.
- **Accepting New Patients:** Yes. Appointments are currently scheduled 4 months out (as of April 2026).

Memorial Hospital of Converse County

- **Care Provided:** Neurology and epilepsy.
- **Ages of Children Accepted:** Depending on the provider, 15+ or 16+.
- **Insurances Accepted:** Private insurance, Medicare, and Medicaid.
- **Referral Required:** Yes.
- **Telehealth:** No.
- **Providers Traveling to Other Sites:** Yes, one provider travels to Douglas, WY, on one Wednesday per month.
- **Accepting New Patients:** Yes. Appointments are currently scheduled for 2 months out (as of April 2026).

- **Providers Referring to Other Providers:** Refers to Children’s Hospital of Colorado (Denver, CO).
- **Interpreters and Accessibility Accommodation:** No interpretation is available.

Wyoming Neurologic Associates

- **Care Provided:** Neurology and epilepsy.
- **Ages of Children Accepted:** 2+, only for patients with seizures. No other neurological condition. One provider only sees teenagers and older.
- **Insurances Accepted:** Private insurance, Medicare, and Medicaid. They offer a 20% discount if patients pay out of pocket at the time of service.
- **Referral Required:** No.
- **Telehealth:** Yes, only for established patients.
- **Providers Traveling to Other Sites:** No.
- **Accepting New Patients:** Yes. Appointments are currently scheduled 3 months out (as of April 2026).
- **Providers Referring to Other Providers:** Refers to Children’s Hospital of Colorado (Denver, CO).
- **Interpreters and Accessibility Accommodation:** No interpretation is available.

UCHealth Neurology Clinic

- **Care Provided:** Neurology and epilepsy.
- **Ages of Children Accepted:** Only 18+.
- **Telehealth:** Yes, for follow-up appointments.
- **Providers Traveling to Other Sites:** Yes, this clinic is based in Loveland, Colorado, but the provider travels to Cheyenne, Wyoming, every other Monday.
- **Accepting New Patients:** Yes. Appointments are currently scheduled 10-15 months out (as of April 2026).

Campbell County Health - Sheridan Neurology, P.C. and Cloud Peak Sleep Specialist, LLC

- **Care Provided:** Neurology and epilepsy.
- **Ages of Children Accepted:** Typically 18+, but they do see patients who are 14-18 on a case-by-case basis.
- **Insurances Accepted:** Private insurance, Medicare, and Wyoming Medicaid.
- **Referral Required:** Yes.
- **Telehealth:** No.
- **Providers Traveling to Other Sites:** Yes, to Gillette and Cody, Wyoming.
- **Accepting New Patients:** Two PAs are accepting new patients, depending on location. Appointments are currently (as of April 2026) being scheduled 1-3 months out.
- **Providers Referring to Other Providers:** Refers to providers in Billings, Montana, but depends on the patient.
- **Interpreters and Accessibility Accommodation:** No interpretation is available.

Neurology Specialists of the Rockies

- **Care Provided:** Neurology and seizures.

- **Ages of Children Accepted:** Children and adults.
- **Insurances Accepted:** Private, Medicare, and Medicaid. Does not accept CO Medicaid.
- **Referral Required:** Yes.
- **Telehealth:** No, unless road conditions prevent an in-person visit.
- **Providers Traveling to Other Sites:** Yes, providers travel between Cheyenne, Wyoming, and Fort Collins, Colorado.
- **Accepting New Patients:** Yes. Appointments are currently scheduled 1-2 months out (as of April 2026).
- **Providers Referring to Other Providers:** Refers to Children's Hospital of Colorado (Denver, CO).
- **Interpreters and Accessibility Accommodation:** No.

Memorial Hospital of Sweetwater County

- **Care Provided:** Neurology and seizures.
- **Ages of Children Accepted:** Only 18+.
- **Insurances Accepted:** WY Medicaid, Medicare, and Private.
- **Referral Required:** Yes.
- **Telehealth:** Yes, only for established patients.
- **Providers Traveling to Other Sites:** No.
- **Accepting New Patients:** Yes. Appointments are currently scheduled 2-3 months out (as of April 2026).
- **Providers Referring to Other Providers:** Refers to providers in Salt Lake City, Utah.
- **Interpreters and Accessibility Accommodation:** Yes - Spanish in-person and other languages via Telehealth.
- **Community Supports:** Financial navigators and social workers located at the hospital.

Frontier NeuroHealth

- **Care Provided:** Neurohealth (holistic) and epilepsy.
- **Ages of Children Accepted:** Typically 18+, but they do see patients who are 15-18 on a case-by-case basis.
- **Insurances Accepted:** VA, Medicare, Medicaid, and Private.
- **Referral Required:** No.
- **Telehealth:** Yes, for follow-up appointments.
- **Providers Traveling to Other Sites:** Yes.
- **Accepting New Patients:** Yes. Appointments are currently being scheduled 1-4 months out, depending on location and provider (as of April 2026).
- **Providers Referring to Other Providers:** Refers to providers in Billings, Montana.
- **Interpreters and Accessibility Accommodation:** Provides a device that translates in real time, but not live.

St. John's Health

- **Care Provided:** Neurology and epilepsy.
- **Ages of Children Accepted:** Only 18+.
- **Insurances Accepted:** Private, Medicare, Medicaid, and anything St. John's accepts.

- **Referral Required:** Yes.
- **Telehealth:** No.
- **Providers Traveling to Other Sites:** Yes.
- **Accepting New Patients:** No. As of April 2026, they are booked out 6-9 months.
- **Providers Referring to Other Providers:** Refers to providers in Salt Lake City, Utah.
- **Interpreters and Accessibility Accommodation:** Tele-interpretation/remote translator over video.

North Dakota

CHI St. Alexius Health Neurology Clinic

- **Care Provided:** General and pediatric neurology - Brain, nervous system, headaches, migraines, epilepsy, and other neurologic conditions.
- **Ages of Children Accepted:** Pediatric patients.
- **Insurances Accepted:** Accepts major insurance plans; patients need to call beforehand.
- **Telehealth:** Yes, some providers, but not all.
- **Accepting New Patients:** Yes, accepting new Telehealth patients (as of April 2026).

Essentia Health - 32nd Avenue Clinic

- **Care Provided:** Pediatric neurology - Brain, spine, nerve & muscle conditions; epilepsy/seizure, headaches, developmental and neurologic disorders.
- **Ages of Children Accepted:** Pediatric patients.
- **Insurances Accepted:** Medicaid, Medicare, and private.
- **Referral Required:** Yes.
- **Telehealth:** Yes.
- **Accepting New Patients:** Yes, as of April 2026.

Altru Clinic - Altru Health System

- **Care Provided:** Pediatric neurology - Comprehensive care for children with neurologic disease (e.g., seizures, migraine, developmental delays, headaches, etc.)
- **Ages of Children Accepted:** 0-18.
- **Insurances Accepted:** Accepts major insurance plans; patients need to call beforehand.
- **Providers Traveling to Other Sites:** Yes.

Sanford Clinic / Sanford Brain & Spine Center / Sanford Children's Campus - Bismarck

- **Care Provided:** Adult and pediatric neurosurgery treating brain bleeds, Chiari, hydrocephalus, spina bifida, TBI, etc. Also performs tumor removals, shunt placement, and other neurosurgical procedures.
- **Ages of Children Accepted:** Children and adults.
- **Insurances Accepted:** Private, Medicare, and Medicaid.
- **Providers Traveling to Other Sites:** Yes, some providers travel to other sites.
- **Accepting New Patients:** Yes, as of April 2026, some providers are accepting new patients.
- **Interpreters and Accessibility Accommodation:** Yes.

Children's Medical Centers

Overview

Families seeking pediatric specialty care within a children's medical center setting will find a few options across the region, with Utah offering the most comprehensive centers, including nationally ranked children's hospitals and Level IV Epilepsy Centers. Because Wyoming does not have a dedicated children's medical center, many families travel to nearby states such as Utah, Colorado, Montana, and North Dakota for specialized services, while continuing to access general pediatric care locally.

Utah

Wyoming

Wyoming does not have any Children's Medical Centers. Families typically travel to surrounding states (Colorado, Utah, Montana) for specialty care at medical centers. At times, pediatric specialists will travel from surrounding states periodically throughout the month/year. Families are encouraged to check with their local clinic and hospital to see if they offer specialty consultations through traveling providers.
