Advocacy - Your Voice to Educate for Change

What is advocacy?

Advocacy is defined as any action that speaks in favor of, recommends, argues for a cause, supports or defends, or pleads on behalf of others.

How do you tell them?

How you communicate is as important as what you communicate. Your method of communication may often determine whether you get what you want...

Remember...

"You get more flies with honey than with vinegar."

Did you know when you speak ...

- People listen the following way -
 - > 7% is the words you use
 - ▶ 38% is verbal the sounds you makes
 - pitch
 - volume
 - Speed
 - Tone
 - ▶ 55% is non-verbal
 - body language
 - appearance
 - facial expressions

How do I say it?

Assertive Communication means you:

- Start positive, stay on topic; be consistent, brief and use a clear and reasonable tone of voice
- make sure the other person understands what you've said - your point of view is a clear, factual, relevant first hand story
- ask for specific information when you don't understand
- 'keep your cool'; put your best self forward
- Be willing to listen to another point of view, even if you don't agree with it; agree to disagree

Aggressive Communication means you:

- shout or yell to get your point across
- use verbal or written abuse,
 swearing, or threats to get your point across
- don't use anecdotal stories that you have heard second or third hand.
- interrupt the other person
- unwilling to listen to the other person

- Those wishing to testify during a standing committee meeting can register to enter the Zoom meeting for each committee by clicking the "testify" button provided on the Legislature's calendar page at www.wyoleg.gov.
- People wishing to submit written materials to a committee are asked to email the completed <u>committee handout form</u> and your documents to each member of the committee and also to <u>legdocs@wyoleg.gov</u>. In your e-mail, please include the committee name, meeting date, document author and document provider. <u>Remember these documents become public record.</u>
