Building Trust in Providers Through Biographies on the Blackfeet Reservation (Browning, MT)

Hypothesis

Offering Blackfeet Community Hospital (BCH) provider biographies to patients will increase trust for providers in the community and increase awareness of care alternatives such as PAs and NPs leading to less Emergency Department visits and more preventative and primary care.

Background

- The Blackfeet Reservation is one of the largest in the country, with over 1.5 million acres bordered by Glacier National Park to the west and Canada to the North
- There are over 15,000 enrolled Niitsitapi or Real People, with approximately 7000 tribal members living on or near the reservation
- Blackfeet Community Health Assessment (CHA) identified access to primary care as a "Priority Concern"
- 26% of Blackfeet Reservation residents go to the Emergency Department to receive care or health advice, instead of scheduling a doctor's appointment
- 9% of CHA survey participants indicated they don't have a trusted doctor and 34% said they can't get an appointment with one

Literature Review

- Trust is a barrier to accessing care and can be established through relationships
- Over 50% of potential patients review biographies before selecting providers
- Provider biographies foster patient involvement, satisfaction and trust in care
- Patients want to know their provider's education
- In general, knowledge of PA and NP abilities is low compared to knowledge of physician abilities
- There is mistrust for medical establishments in Indigenous communities
